Gossip

Well *that* was an interesting season! When we welcomed winter a couple of issues ago **we didn't expect it to last through the end of March!** We hope you either enjoyed, anew, an array of cold weather sports or had a happy hibernation — your choice.

One of our winter routines is to visit the auto show. Yeah, **we mostly go to sneer** at the still-way-too-low gas mileages and to be shocked that **they're building even bigger SUVs with worse aerodynamics and gas mileage than before.** How do SUV drivers keep from getting dizzy with the gas gauge spinning like that? Anyway, there were some bright spots. **Honda's Insight** (61 mpg city/68 hwy) and **Toyota's Prius** (52 city/45 hwy), both gas-electric hybrids, drew **impressive audience interest.** Ford's **all-electric car** was like an enclosed golf cart. The **ThinkCity**, was cute as a bug (not VW) and looked like a good choice if all you do is buzz around town or for short urban commutes, which is what most urban driving is about. Plastic body doesn't rust but had the look and feel of Rubbermaid. **They also promoted their ThinkBike Traveler and ThinkBike Fun electric bicycles.** Convenient, no-work transportation for urban commuters or to take on motor-camping trips when you wanna roll on down to the miniature golf course. All that hubbub and we read that bicycling is second only to automobiles as transportation in this country! (We mean the human-powered kind of bike.) The **Bureau of Transportation Statistics**, in their October 2000 household survey, learned that about 20 percent of Americans used a bicycle within 30 days for transportation. Cycling's also up there as a *preferred* means of travel,

chosen over public transportation. Let's see, hmmm. What could be done to combine cycling with public transportation to make an even more popular mix?

There will be a press conference at the annual EarthFest on the 22nd announcing some exciting developments for commuters who would like to use their bikes for transportation. Watch the news media for this or, better yet, go to EarthFest and learn firsthand!

Speaking of activism (*see above*) longtime environmental activist **Ms. Daryl Davis** was featured in a *WestLife Newspaper* page-one article back in February. She's more involved with the Green Party now — trying to **influence the political "system" to protect and improve the environment.** She is also the founder of Wheels of Change in Cleveland which had as its aim environmental improvement through the use of bicycles as transportation. Of course, to increase the use of the bicycle in transportation, better facilities and a few amenities would be needed. *See above.* **She said the two-party system is too polarized and that the only way to progress is via the Middle Path.** Too polarized? Ya think? Republicans and Democrats have been so embroiled in a "victory for our side" tussle for quite some years now, that someone got left out... us.

The Cleveland Metroparks System was busy killing off the deer population over the winter and **working on euphemisms and image building.** They started the kills a couple of years ago after lots of P.R. effort bad-mouthing Bambi. They even went so far as to say the deer were destroying the nature of the Metroparks. The deer, we understand, only intended to find a place to live and something to eat. **Now public wildlife managers are vilifying coyotes.** That effort became visible, oh, about two years ago. **Funny how any wild animal that manages to flourish despite human encroachment on their habitat becomes a pest or a threat.** So we predict this: that in the short- to medium-term the public hunters, er, wildlife managers will begin killing off, er, culling coyotes. Then the rabbit and rodent populations will explode. Well, we think you can take it from there; it's all connected.

It's almost breathtaking how fast **George Bush** has started to dismantle worker and environmental protections. And how, **in the gleam of enormous projected federal budget surpluses** he and his fellows have put **budget cuts and restrictions** in place on such things as science and space exploration — the seed corn of human progress and, for that matter, to our economy. **Same with Ohio's "literacy governor" and his budget cuts to libraries. Libraries!!** Where does **Mr. T** think **students go** to do their homework and their research papers? **Where do little kids go** to pick out their first picture books and keep returning to as they, and their minds, grow? **Where do adults go** to brush up on their math, prepare for a new job, understand what the doctor said, or get some great reading material just for fun? **For gosh sakes, where have people been coming for well-on 100 years to learn to read?** Don't be deceived, it's not a budget "freeze" that will affect Ohio's libraries, it's a series of budgetary shifts and reductions that amount to **a major cut and there's no doubt about it.** Ask any library director how Mr. T's budget will affect your library if it goes into effect. **They may be talking about reducing the number of hours a week they can keep the lights turned on ... it's that bad.** Write to your state legislator and to "Mr. Literacy" (Gov. Taft, aka "Mr. T") in Columbus. **Make sure they know you want no cuts in community learning resources; keep Ohio's libraries strong!** Whew.

Sorry to hear of the death of Charles Simpson. He and his wife Joan loved cycling together, even completing a trip from Melbourne to Sydney, Australia in 1988. Failing health caused Charles to stop cycling a few years ago. He had Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases and died Dec. 16, 2000 at age 78 at the Good Samaritan nursing home in Avon. He and Joan had been married for 48 years. His *Plain Dealer* obituary reflected a life of adventure and optimism — a good person to have had around.

We were pleased to attend the grand opening party for the new Century Cycles store in Solon. That was back on January 27 and it was a good thing the store didn't have

bikes on display yet... there was a big crowd. **"We've made a lot of friends over the years,"** said owner **Scott Cowan.** Yep. We ran into the new owner of **Fairview Cycle, Diane Lees of HubBub, Doug Anderson formerly of Western Reserve Cycle Sport,** fellow bikies, CC staffers. The Solon store (now fully stocked) has **6,000 square feet** of retail space and will display upwards of 400 bicycles! **Solon will now be HQ of the Century Cycles Empire** so you'll be seeing **Lois Cowan** (co-owner) in attendance there regularly. They're located in Solon Square Shopping Center three doors down from the giant **Tops Friendly Market.** Hon, when you go to pick up your new Litespeed, could you stop and get a carton of milk? Early indications are it'll be a hit. One day, before much stock was in place, Scott & Co. just decided to open the door and see what would happen. Very shortly thereafter, their first customers started wandering in. There were still paint fumes and enough open floor space to hold a crit. **Good luck with the new operation, Century!**

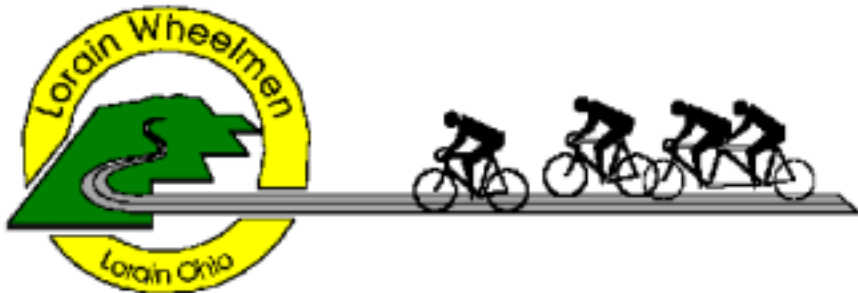

Club Policy Change!

At a recent meeting of the CTC Board of Directors the issue of **excessive gearing** was again raised. It seems that manufacturers are producing bikes with as many as 27 gears and maybe be introducing 30 gears as we speak! This simply cannot go on. The exponential rise in gearing has caused other club members to get jealous and feel disenfranchised. So they have gone out and bought new bikes with more gears too. And no sooner was one season over and everyone had their newly geared bikes, but the next one was upon us and several more gears were required just to keep pace. More than one member has been brought to the brink of financial ruin by these practices. Pretty soon our bike purchases will look like our rides, with one rider getting out ahead and the rest desperately trying to keep up.

Our wise board of directors has decided to nip this in the bud. Henceforth a proclamation has been issued mandating a gear limit on club rides. You may only ride a bike with a **maximum of 15 gears**. Club monitors, armed with gear extractors will be out on rides carefully watching. Scofflaws will have their bikes pulled to the side of the road and will have to stand there, humiliated, as they and the entire club watches their gears being stripped of all teeth save one. They shall have to ride a **one-speed** for the duration of the season. Beware. This could be you.

The Annual Hinckley Buzzard Ride

Sunday dawned cold but sunny. After a Saturday full of snow the weather had cleared as well as the roads and **Gayle Swan** and I set out for Northfield Center and the start of the ride. In past years, bad weather has kept many away so it was with some surprise to discover we were the only riders to show. We can only attribute this to either *CrankMail* being delivered a bit late or the fact that so many of our ageing club members have no access to spinning classes in their assisted living homes.

Nonetheless we started out for Hinckley on our tandem shortly after 10AM, braving a chilly downhill into the Cuyahoga Valley, to be followed by a hot climb out the other side. The roads were empty and the sight of sharply defined shadows was a treat after the grayness of the past winter (at least I hope it's past).

Arriving at the Hinckley elementary school we waited on line to buy tickets to the all-you-can-eat pancake breakfast. Inside we warmed up with lots of hot water (yup, we drink hot water, straight).

Harvey Webster, History Museum naturalist showed off his 15-year friend, a buzzard kept by the museum since his unfortunate encounter with a car left him unable to fly (the buzzard that is, not Harvey. Harvey can fly). In one hilarious moment, a small boy was waving a dollar bill in the buzzard's face in a vain attempt to gain his attention. He just didn't quite understand...

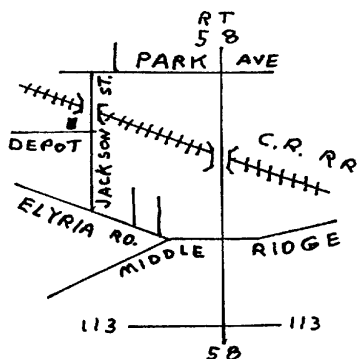
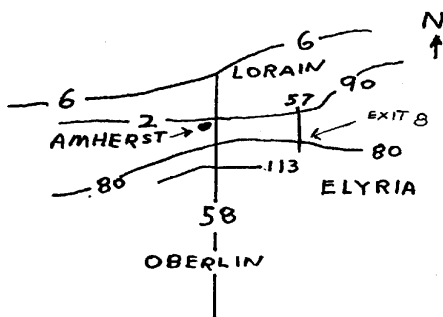
This is a ride for everyone to enjoy and an opportunity to put in some early season miles. The route will be over mostly secondary roads and the terrain is generally flat. Tour the historic towns and villages of Lorain County on the same day as the Paris-Roubaix but without the cobbles. There will be one route with three cutoffs to provide routes of 25, 50, 64 and 100 miles.

Although this is a FREEBIE ride, there will be a map and the routes are marked with arrows on the road. All riders will be **required to wear an approved helmet** to participate in AFROST. **There will be no SAG wagon, ride patches, or food stops.** There are many places to buy food along the routes.

Donations of no more than \$.50 will be accepted on the day of the ride to cover the cost of printing of the maps.

Registration will be from 8:00 AM to 9:30 AM and leave at your leisure. Registration, start-finish and parking will be at the Nordson Depot on Franklin Ave. (just off Jackson St.) in Amherst.

The March, 2001 Club Meeting

Bike Recycling Project Revived, Seeking Mentors, Tour Leaders

Nearly 10 years ago, the Cleveland Area Bicycling Association began Christmas caroling around town on bikes and passing the hat to create an "earn-a-bike" program; a way for kids to earn donated, used bikes while they learn repair skills. The all-volunteer effort, which became known as **ReBicycle Cleveland!**, culminated in a project for 30 kids from East Cleveland who rode the bikes they had repaired, wearing their new helmets, in the 1996 11th District community parade.

The project foundered, though, when volunteers moved and started families. In the meantime, similar programs began and flourished in many other cities, even spawning a kind of trade association, the Youth Bicycle Education Network (www.YBEN.org). Transportation Alternatives published a how-to guide. A bike recycling project founder won a Rolex Award. And the Oberlin bike coop started an earn-a-bike program within a morning's bike ride of Cleveland.

Finally, the critical mass of interest has again been reached here. This time it is combined with experience and expertise, and supported by partner organizations with the potential to make a full-fledged program a reality. Altrans, the advocacy group which successfully campaigned for bike racks on area transit busses, brought together former bike-coop members from Oberlin and Antioch Colleges, members of the Earth Day Coalition, mechanics from Century Cycles, educators, and former **ReBicycle Cleveland!** volunteers to work on the project. It will be housed, at least initially, at the Arrupe Center, the community-outreach program of St. Ignatius High School on West 30th St. in Ohio City. The West Side YMCA will also be an active partner.

The project will start as an informal bike club where kids in the neighborhood can gather to ride, repair, and learn about bikes and cycling. Meetings will be on Fridays from 6 to 8 p.m. As the organizers, partners and participants get to know one another, it is expected to develop a more formal earn-a-bike program with more open hours, as well as other activities to foster cooperation, teamwork and community spirit.

One important activity will be group riding: club rides, tours, probably some of the many BMX disciplines, and maybe some time trials or even a race team. For this, the expertise and experience of *CrankMail* readers would be an invaluable asset. If individuals or clubs want to become involved in this or any other capacity, they should call Mike McLaughlin at the Arrupe Center, 216-961-1260.
